Who are Children in Crossfire and what do we do?

We fund a service for treating acutely malnourished children. Although our community outreach and education work aims to reduce the number of children reaching this distressing stage. To protect the dignity of our families we won't show a picture of a child fighting for life. Here's a healthy baby being weighed at the Karume Clinic. We provided training to Mary the nurse you see here. She sees up to 100 babies every day. Just £5 provides a child with emergency therapeutic food for a month.



There are 100's of our health workers out in the community educating mothers in nutrition to prevent malnutrition.

This is Meron, age 5 enjoying a healthy breakfast before school. Being well nourished will help her learn – hungry children can't learn.

Educating children out of poverty – breaking the cycle. Here are some happy children learning at one of the Pre-Primary Schools in Mhonze, Tanzania. Children who access good early childhood education are proven to do better at school and in life. A teacher's salary costs just £300 a year.



Helping parents set up small businesses so they can provide for their families themselves. Mageni 42, one of our community co-ordinators growing vegetables to feed her family and sell at market. She also helps other women do the same by running our Women's Group in her village. We have 96 groups with 1700 members. It cost £60 to train Mageni to help others and just £16 provides seeds and basic tools.

Here is one of our nursing graduates. We fund scholarships to 12 students each year. It's a 3 year nursing course and costs £3,000 per student.



Each well we provide will change the lives and improve the health of up to 3,000 people. Remuzat, aged 8 pictured here is happy to be able to go to school instead of carrying water. We've funded 6 wells costing £6,000 each in the past year.
